1. Set the brain up to learn! Arrive to class on time.

Get your class materials ready on your desk. You'll need a dictionary, a notebook, a pencil/pen, and a highlighter.

2. Engage yourself in class activities. Listen to the language, speak it, sing it, read it, practice with your partner, the whole class, and work independently.



3. If you're having trouble, actively seek out resources. Grab a dictionary, ask a partner, check the Internet; ask your teacher for help.

4. High-achieving Level 4 learners respond to all prompts, use correct punctuation and capitalization, use creativity; problem solve and apply cultural intelligence.

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
5. Keep up with the class! If you're absent, make up the work. Communicate with your teacher to ensure you are up to speed.

6. Work hard, study each night, & practice! If your academic progress shows below-standard work (D or F grade), you will qualify for an extra support class to help you meet standard in your World Language course. This *World Language Study Skills* class is held year round, after school every Tuesday from 2:35-3:35.


7. Use the language for personal enrichment. Seek out magazines, Internet resources, download music, get involved in the community with your language, & teach someone else what you're learning.

8. Assessments: Study. Hard. Come in and get help if you're struggling, ask questions in class, & seek out additional resources for extra practice.

9. Re-assessment: Pick up a re-assessment form and follow the steps *carefully*. All assignments/practices must be completed prior to taking an exam. You may re-assess on unit quizzes. You may not re-assess on unit final exams or the semester final exam.



10. Miss school, miss out! It's all the little listening and speaking practices, having your flashcards ready to use, getting that cultural reading; they all add up. If you miss school or come to class unprepared, you risk turning your language brain into Swiss cheese (lots of holes). Keep up and be prepared.
